A Message from Pastor Laura

The book of Acts depicts life in the disrupting presence of the Spirit of God.

- Willie James Jennings



Jody Colby, Ryan Gracey, Karin Daniels, and I spent a weekend together in September 2019 at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. It was my second weekend as your pastor, and it was their third meeting at the seminary with the Church Revitalization program. This year-long program required our church members to think in new ways about how to encounter God’s Spirit at work within

the congregation, the neighborhood, and the world. It also required that participants read four books. Willie James Jennings commentary on Acts is one of those books.

The Rev. Dr. Scott Hagley assigned Jennings’ Acts commentary to Jody, Ryan, and Karin because Jennings reads the Bible, ‘against the grain.’ He, to quote John Carroll, “inspires readers who seek to listen with care to what Acts has to say to the theological and ethical challenges of contemporary life.” Jennings approaches Acts with an understanding of the book having been written in the 80s or 90s AD, a time of radical beginning for the church. This radical beginning takes place in the everyday and in the disciples’ mundane course of living. He relates this action of the Spirit then to the action of the Spirit now.

Acts is our text for the coming months because of Jennings’ text. I will be preaching each week, beginning August, using the headings and breakdown used in this particular Acts commentary. I am doing this, first, to bring to the congregation what was learned by our team during the Church Revitalization program. Second, I am doing this because Jennings’ commentary is all the more relevant in a post-pandemic world whose changes rival the changes faced by the early church.

You are encouraged to follow along in Acts with us. Come and worship with us each Sunday so that you can keep track of the narrative of the Holy Spirit’s movement in the church. Be in conversation with your church family about what you hear, as well as what you read. Dig deep with us as we dig deep into this Spirit-breathed, Spirit-saturated book of our Bible!

The Pittsburgh Presbytery has adopted a call to legislators to act on behalf of preserving voter rights for all legal voters. The resolution notes that several states have begun enacting legislation that makes it more difficult for those with limited means to vote.

Providing for equal access to the ballot box for all eligible votes is a faith concern for people who believe that every human being is made equally in God's image.

Jesus rebukes his disciples for preventing "the little ones" from gaining access to him, thus teaching that everyone great and small is equally privileged in God's kingdom (Matthew 19:13-15). In Matthew 25:31-46, Jesus equates the welcome we give to the poor and vulnerable with welcoming him personally.

Any legislation that makes it more difficult for people to vote if they are economically disadvantaged

runs contrary to biblical teaching. The church of Jesus has no option but to stand up for just treatment for every person.

Mission Updates

At the June 12 meeting of the Mission Commission the following business was accomplished:

- We agreed food insufficiency is still a great need. We allocated \$500 to the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank and \$500 to SHIM (South Hills Interfaith Movement).
- We remembered Matt Hale, Navigator and friend of the congregation. After contacting Nancy Hale, Jody discovered Matt had a “Go Fund Me” for financing a van replacement for his ministry in Detroit. We contributed \$1400 to help him reach his goal.
- We also learned that Matt would be visiting in town the week following July 4. We quickly made arrangements for a Meet & Greet on Thursday, July 7, where 18 members caught up on Matt’s activities. It is awe inspiring to discover the loving, sharing community that Matt and his family have created and supported for almost two decades in the depressed inner city of Detroit.
- We continue with our support of Café Justo on the Mexican border by selling their free trade coffee at a reduced price of \$10 a pound. See Jody Colby or Beth Romig for purchases of regular or decaf, ground or whole bean.
- We continue to sponsor our World Vision daughter Pabatso Makhalanyane, in S. Africa.

Information about the refugees from Afghanistan comes to us through our connection with Hello neighbor. They have settled over 250 families and individuals in the Pittsburgh area since January. Recently, they were able to meet emergency food shortages for the refugee families. There are opportunities for individuals or communities to support these refugees and new refugees of other ethnic groups. 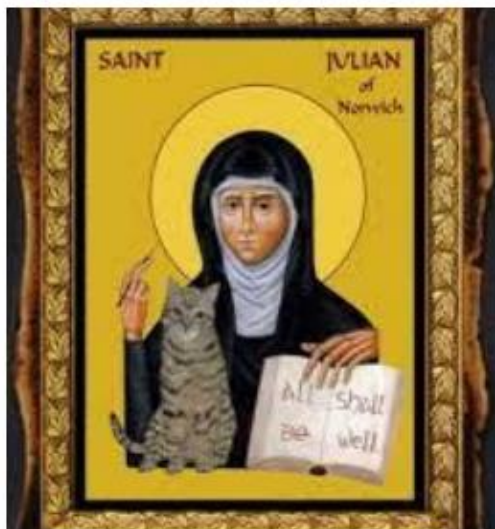


An English Pilgrimage

Open the journal that's too beautiful to write in and encounter Jesus. Our ten days in England will include introductions to Christian authors from the Middle Ages and 20th Century. We will walk with these saints as we discover new prayer practices and take on the practice of spiritual, reflective writing.



Find Your Community

There are eight spots on this trip, enabling us to form an intentional community of prayer, support, and encouragement of one another.

We will journal and pray together daily. All writings will be private, and only shared with the author's permission. The goal is vulnerability before Jesus, and judgment before no one.

Discover Sacred Spaces

Julians' Norwich, and the Divinity School of Oxford University are included in our pilgrimage. We will have three orientations before our trip, including reading assignments to prepare ourselves for the sites visited. These orientations and readings are an essential part of building our pilgrimage community, connecting with the saints who've gone before, and growing in faith.

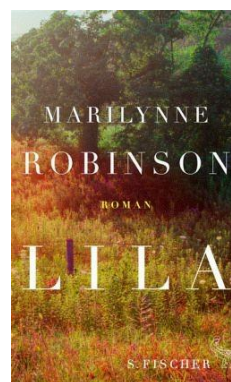
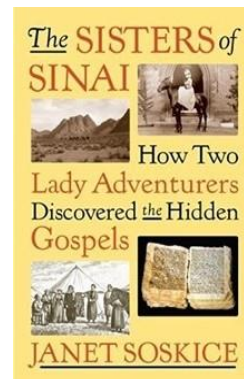

Sunset Hills Book Club MEETING IN PERSON August Book of the Month *The Sisters of Sinai* By Janice Soskice Aug. 31st - 7:30 pm

Janet Soskice takes us, via the lives of Agnes and Margaret Smith, on a quintessentially Victorian adventure. It is partly a physical journey: when Westerners generally feared to tread in the region, the sisters Smith traversed the Middle East, sleeping in tents, enduring temperamental camels and unscrupulous dragomen, and facing uncertain welcome from monks deceived by earlier travelers. It is also a journey of the mind: in an era when religious faith was under attack, when new discoveries in science and archaeology were rewriting the accepted understanding of the Bible's origins as well as those of humankind, a great contribution to knowledge was made by two whose only natural advantage was an astonishing gift for languages, modern as well as classical. Finally, and most movingly, it is a progress of the human spirit. Unwilling to let their lack of formal training or the disdain and jealousy of male scholars stand in their way, Agnes and Margaret became renowned scriptural authorities, in joyful pursuit of their lifelong passions for adventure and learning. Here, rousingly recounted, is the story of two unlikely and unsung heroines of the continuing effort to discover the Bible as originally written. (Amazon Book Description)
