A Message from Pastor Laura

I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a deacon of the church in Cenchreae. I ask you to receive her in the Lord in a new way worthy of his people and to give her any help she may need from you, for she has been the benefactor of many people, including me. – Romans 16:1-2



I am celebrating the Feast Day of St. Phoebe today. This is strange because, as a Presbyterian, I don't typically observe feast days and I don't typically revere the Saints. But I am celebrating because it is a beautiful thing to remember those who have gone on in the faith before us. These individuals include our parents, grandparents, childhood Sunday School teachers, and people whose names are briefly mentioned in the letters of the Apostle Paul.

Thus, let's talk a little bit about Saint Phoebe today. Who was she? First, she was a deacon. The literal translation of the Greek word *diakonos* is actually minister. Phoebe is a leader in the early church. Second, Phoebe is a woman of independent means. She may be a widow who's inherited funds, or she may be a business owner not unlike Lydia, the purveyor of purple cloth. Phoebe has enough money to be able to finance Paul and the early church's various ministries. Third, Phoebe is traveler. She is probably the person who carried Paul's letter to the church in Rome. Paul directs the church to show her hospitality, and to welcome her.

We remember today that alongside Phoebe, there are countless other women and men who have walked with the church in times of struggle. There are women who took leadership roles, even when formalized leadership ceased to be permitted and before the doors to such roles were opened again. There are men who acted in compassion and bravery. There are thousands upon thousands, if not millions, who have done the arduous work of serving Christ's church through serving God's children.

Whatever it is that you do in God's name, beloved, you are supported by a foundation of saints who have come before. You are not alone. Phoebe, alongside the great cloud of witnesses, by the power of the Holy Spirit are with you and cheering you on every step of your Christian way!

Music Notes By Shelby Gracey

Every year at this time I'm always so happy to welcome the Chancel Choir back after their summer hiatus. Sadly, we still have no choir back since the "pandemic hiatus" started in March. But I was thrilled to welcome the Campanile Bell Choir back for our first rehearsal on Sept. 15th! Since there's no other news to report this month, I wanted to share another hymn story – something to reflect on as we continue this crazy way of life right now.

"As J.S. Bach stated, "The aim and final reason for all music should be nothing else but the glory of God and the refreshment of the spirit." To give glory to God should be the greatest desire of every Christian. Not only should this be the supreme goal for our individual lives, but it should also be true for a congregation as a whole. We must always be alert in recognizing God's leading in our midst and in acknowledging His hand of blessing upon our church's endeavors – the 'great things He hath taught us and the great things He hath Without this sensitive done.' awareness and gratitude, churcheslike individuals-can easily lose focus of their mission and develop a false sense of self-worth and sufficiency.

"This fine gospel hymn, written by Fanny J. Crosby, first appeared in a Sunday school collection in 1875. In 1952 the Billy Graham Crusade Team went to England, where they first made extensive use of "To God Be the Glory" in their meetings. It was an immediate success. Upon their return to the United States, they found the same enthusiastic response by



American audiences. It has been a favorite hymn ever since.

"The hymn differs from most of the hymns written by Fanny Crosby in that it is a more objective praise of God rather than the typical subjective testimony or Christian experience type of song. It's a fine blend of the characteristics of both the hymn and the gospel song."

To God be the glory – great things He hath done! So loved He the world that He gave us His son, who yielded His life an atonement for sin and opened the Lifegate that all may go in.

Great things He hath taught us, great things He hath done, and great our rejoicing thru Jesus the Son; but purer and higher and greater will be our wonder, our transport, when Jesus we see.

Chorus: Praise the Lord, Praise the Lord, let the earth hear His voice! Praise the Lord, Praise the Lord, let the people rejoice! O come to the Father thru Jesus the Son, and give Him the glory – great things He hath done.

Gifts support leadership development by funding the Katie Geneva Cannon Scholarship and Conference for Seminarians of color.


The campaign recognizes the importance of the following dates:

- August 28, 1955, 14 year-old Emmett Till was brutally murdered and that became a flashpoint in the Civil Rights movement.
- August 28, 1963, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his iconic speech "I Have a Dream" in Washington D.C.
- August 28, 2005 Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans and inordinately impacted the city's black residents.
- August 28, 2008, Sen. Barack
 Obama accepted the nomination for President of the United States.

There is critical need for resources in Black communities during the Covid-19 and recent killings of unarmed Black people. The Presbyterian Church USA and our SHUP missions have chosen to support that need.

Children's Footprints... By Barb Clark

Confusion 2020, is the name of the game this year. I do not remember when I was more confused. Do you feel the same? Since March of this year, I feel like I have not received a straight answer for anything. From my personal life to the medical field, and finally to the political arena. It is like being on a merry-go-round. Contradictions are coming at me at a rate of speed that does not give me enough time to peel them apart and try to make sense out of them.

My thoughts turn to scripture, and I wonder where this much confusion was in the Bible. I am led once again to the wilderness walking in Exodus. Why did we leave they ask, we should have stayed, oh look at the shiny golden calf, we are tired of manna, oh wait here comes Moses..... As their heads were spinning with confusion, I believe there is a lesson in here for me and you!

Just imagine for a moment how close they must have been so many times to the promise land and did not even know it. They probably looked out in front of them, or behind them maybe to the east and west and it was there in plain view with not an inkling of what lay ahead. I feel like that is us. Just spinning in circles listening to this person or that person. Then they change their minds and rebuke what was said. I guess in a nutshell I would really like some clarity on something, anything..... I feel like people are in a state of confusion, like they think they know, they want to know,

and just about the time they have the answer – BAM they do not. And no one person, can answer the questions about, well frankly, anything on topic in 2020.

It truly baffles me, so I continually turn to God, to the Trinity - the *connectiveness* of our Faith - for answers and comfort.

Read John 16:5-16. Who is in control in our lives? The Holy Spirit should be. In the study book called <u>When</u> <u>God's Spirit Moves</u>, you realize again who the Holy Spirit is, almost for the first time. Why in the world, do the people of God (us), not rely enough on this crucial part of the Trinity anymore? The book also describes the various symbols of the of the Holy Spirit in tangible ways. I would ask you to take a moment to sit and visualize and drink in and feel these descriptions found below:

Breathe – The wind in your hair, drive with the window open and *feel the breath of God* on you. Stand outside in the wind and let the Holy Spirit flow over you and ask the Spirit to fill you, breathe deep and realize that is the breath of God, allow this practice to flood you with his presence!

Water- Baptism, *without water there is no life.* Think now about dew, and how it covers the earth with a blanket, now sit in his presence and let the dew settle on you, filling you and renewing you.

Fire- Is contagious, it is consuming, it consumes everything in its path. God sent fire to the disciples in the

in the Upper Room, *He FILLED them with the Holy Spirit* and from there, look what they accomplished and what is still being accomplished today.

We do not have the answers for any of *Confusion 2020*, but we serve a God who does. We do not need answers we need comfort, the comfort to know we are not in charge. The Trinity has this..... The Holy Spirit is here alive and well for each of us, all you need to do is go boldly to the throne of grace and ask to be filled with the Holy Spirit.

My prayer for you: May the fire of the Holy Spirit consume you, may the morning dew settle on you as the breath of God swirls around filling and renewing you. We need not the answers, we just need to be present in His Presence.

SHUP Baked Goods Exchange Saturday, October 17th


SHUP is planning a baked goods exchange! Just follow these instructions to join in:


Sunset Hills Autumn Book Club Thursday, October 29th 7:00 pm

November Book of the Month Syria's Secret Library

Daraya lies on the fringe of Damascus, just southwest of the Syrian capital. Yet for four years it lived in another world. Besieged by government forces early in the Syrian Civil War, its people were deprived of food, bombarded by heavy artillery, and under the constant fire of snipers. But deep beneath this scene of frightening devastation lay a hidden library. While the streets above echoed with shelling and rifle fire, the secret world below was a haven of books.

Long rows of well-thumbed volumes lined almost every wall: bloated editions with grand leather covers, pocket-sized guides to Syrian poetry, and no-nonsense reference books, all arranged in well-ordered lines. But this precious horde was not bought from publishers or loaned by other libraries--they were the books salvaged and scavenged at great personal risk from the doomed city above.

The story of this extraordinary place and the people who found purpose and refuge in it is one of hope, human resilience, and above all, the timeless, universal love of literature and the compassion and wisdom it fosters. (Amazon.com Book Description)
