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A Message from Pastor Laura

"Prayer is an earnest and familiar talking with God."

—John Knox, Founder of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland (1514-1572)



John Knox's words might seem unremarkable today, but five centuries ago, they were revolutionary. In Knox's time, the Roman Catholic Church held a dominant role in Scotland, where priests acted as intermediaries between God and the faithful. Engaging in Protestant practices could lead to serious repercussions. Yet Knox was unwavering in his conviction that every Christian should have direct access to Scripture in their own language and

the freedom to pray to God personally.

On Reformation Sunday, October 27, we honor both this transformative theology and our denomination's rich Scottish heritage. As someone who isn't Scottish, I want to emphasize that our celebration is not about individual Scottish ancestry but about acknowledging and celebrating the foundational beliefs that unite us.

We invite you to join us in this celebration by donning plaid and enjoying the lively sounds of bagpipes at the start and close of our worship service. Following the service, we will gather for a potluck luncheon—a cherished tradition in our Presbyterian gatherings.

A special highlight of our Reformation Sunday is the Blessing of the Kirken during worship. In Scottish tradition, 'kirken' means church, and this tradition involves blessing every household within the congregation for the year ahead. Whether your household is large or small, we encourage you to invite your loved ones to join us for this meaningful event.

Finally, please find a Reformation Day prayer included in this edition of the Messenger (prayer can be found on page 2). Crafted by Rev. Chris Currie for The Presbyterian Outlook, it thoughtfully reflects our Reformation heritage, our commitment to embracing our Roman Catholic neighbors as friends, and our shared journey forward.

Reformation Prayer

A Reformation Prayer By the Rev. Chris Currie

O Lord our God, on Reformation Sunday we remember the complex legacy of our church. Grant us the internal space to view the ancestors of our faith as their whole selves, gifts and sins together. We remember the courage and stubborn boldness of Martin Luther but cannot reconcile his faith and passion with his fervent antisemitism. We remember the attention to detail of John Calvin, who taught that the church has a responsibility to care for all of society from sewers to schooling. Yet we also confess Calvin's penchant for policy sometimes made Geneva a rather dreary place without nuance for Anabaptists. We remember the boldness of John Knox, who took a stand in the political realm even venturing to lecture monarchs. And we acknowledge his iconoclasm and puritanical impulses left little room for faithful artistic expression.

We give thanks for the beautiful legacy of the Reformation: for the resurgence of the humanities and the gift of reading Scripture and offering our prayers to you in our own tongue, for the examples of those who resisted government overreach and abuse of power, for those who stayed true to their conscience in the face of great loss. We carry these lessons with us knowing they came at a great cost.

Before you, we also name those unsung heroes of the Reformation, women like Marguerite de Navarre and Katharina von Zimmern, who offered gifted insight and political protection to those who might otherwise have been put to death violently or left unable to carry out their reforms. On this Reformation Sunday, we also pray for harmony across denominations, knowing that unity is central to your being. We pray for our Roman Catholic siblings in Christ, alongside other ecclesial traditions, confessing that in many cases, it is mainly culture, political polarization, and familial customs that separate us more than differences in doctrine, practice, or the source of our common faith in Jesus Christ.

Teach us, O God, that perhaps the greatest lesson of the Reformation comes to us from Calvin's unmarked grave. Preserve us from our desire for earthly monuments, keep us from wasting our precious time wringing our hands over ecclesial self-preservation, and re-direct us from worshipping the past and enshrining our dead heroes. Through the gift of baptism, you have not only called elergy or special Christians or only some of us, but you have called each one of us to use our Godgiven gifts to reflect your grace and glory, to impact this world for Christ's sake, and to engage in activities that enable our neighbors to thrive and flourish in this world you so love.

To that end, help us to rejoice in the legacy of the Reformation, to be a church that embraces our role in the public sphere alongside Christians of other traditions and people of other faiths. In our life together, make us an ever-closer likeness of your beloved community. And outside the walls of our community of faith, enable us each to pursue a life, not of completion, but one that looks to the future with confidence that your floly Spirit will bring all things to their proper end. Until then, may we be "reformed and being always reforming," not as a principle in and of itself, but according to your Word, Jesus Christ our Lord, in whose name we pray. Amen.

"The local church has been described as a laboratory where believers learn to love one another regardless of color, nationality, or financial status. Our common heavenly citizenship is the one dominant tie that binds our hearts together. One of the basic results of our weekly corporate worship should be the growing bond of love and unity that develops between believers. This bond of fellowship should result in God's family members learning to care, honor, and serve one another in love. We should treat others with the same tenderness and understanding that we have experienced from God Himself. This determination to live in a love relationship with fellow believers is infinitely more

important than the issues or differences that may separate us.

"Christian unity does not mean that we must eliminate all diversities. We should be able to differ with each other while maintaining love, respect, and a warm, unified spirit. When our differences get out of hand and hard feelings develop, however, the communion service should always be a reminder that we must reconcile our differences and once more restore a spirit of unity within the body of Christ. The bread and cup of the Lord's Supper should remind us of this truth each time we participate together (I Cor. 11:17-34)."


Mission Opportunities


SHIM Clothing Closet


Cloistered, My Years as a Nun By Catherine Coldstream October 30th – 7:30 pm

"Cloistered" takes the reader deep into the hidden world of a traditional



Carmelite monastery as it approaches the third Millennium and tells the story of an intense personal journey into and out of an enclosed life of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Finding an apparently perfect world at Akenside Priory, in Northumberland, Catherine trusts herself to a group of twenty silent women, believing she is trusting herself to God. As the beauty and mystery of an ancient way of life enfold her, she surrenders herself wholly to its power, quite unaware of the complexity and dangers that lie ahead.

An exploration of the limits of trust, Cloistered shows us how far youthful idealism can take us along the road of self-surrender, and of how much harm is done when institutional flaws go unacknowledged. Catherine's honest account of her time in the monastery – and her dramatic flight from it – is both a love song to a lost community and an exploration of what is most compelling, yet most potentially destructive when closed human groups become laws unto themselves.
